



ILLINOIS INSIDER The chocolate brownie was invented in 1893 by the

Palmer House Hotel, one of downtown Chicago's oldest operating hotels.

### DEER PATH INN

Lake Forest

For nearly a century, this stately Tudor-style hotel on Chicago's North Shore has transported guests to an English country manor. Rooms and suites boast original art, floor-to-ceiling drapes, stone-surface baths and luxe linens. Afternoon tea in the elegant English Room is a cherished tradition. Dine there, too, in the bright and fragrant Garden Room or secluded courtyard. Borrow a bike to explore the neighborhood and enjoy cookies in the lobby each afternoon.

### THE DOME AT BLUEBERRY HILL

Cobden

Find your thrill while gleefully glamping in a geodesic dome that pops up on two secluded acres along the Shawnee Hills Wine Trail. The fully insulated dome (with both heat and AC) has a sitting/dining area, two queen bedrooms (one is a loft), a private bath, kitchenette, laundry space and a private patio with a hot tub. Just steps away, a barn stocked with games and activities features an attached covered picnic area adjacent to a grill.

### DRAGONFLY LAKES CABINS

Dahinda

Escape to a cabin in the wilderness east of Galesburg without roughing it—these timber-frame dwellings, sustainably built from wood found on-site, are rustic yet refined. Amenities include woodburning fireplaces, fully equipped kitchens, baths with roomy showers, quality linens and bedding.

High-speed internet and a smart TV help you check in on civilization. Roast hot dogs and toast marshmallows over your private campfire, and do some serious stargazing under a super-dark sky. The fall colors here are spectacular.

### THE DRAKE HOTEL

Chicago

Live like a royal in Suite 550, the Princess Diana Suite-it's where she stayed for three days in 1996, and it retains the aura of her beauty and glamour. Hold court in the 1,500-squarefoot space, which comprises a living room, kitchenette, reading room, a large bedroom and one-and-ahalf baths. Palatial windows frame majestic views of Lake Michigan and skyscrapers. Have afternoon tea at iconic Palm Court, which hosted both Diana and Queen Elizabeth II.

### THE GWEN HOTEL Chicago

Sleep under the sky(scrapers) in a luxury tent pitched on a private 16th-floor terrace overlooking Michigan Avenue. The urban glamping experience is an option (through September 30) when you book the hotel's Gwen Lux Suite, which comes with a 1,000-squarefoot outdoor living space. The 16-foot-diameter Lotus Belle tent features a plush queen bed and eclectic Bohemian decor. And you're never far from the suite's

dining room, living room, wet bar and two-and-a-half baths.

### HAVISHAM HOUSE

Alto Pass

Stay your way in a charming Southern Illinois town surrounded by Shawnee National Forest. Rent the grand and spacious 1892 Main House to get a full modern kitchen, sunlit breakfast room and elegant bath (antique vanity, roomy soaking tub, glass shower enclosure and stained-glass windows). Book the adjacent Carriage House, also built in 1892 and recently renovated, for a cozy blend of old and new. Or hide out in one of two posh suites above the swanky Bourbon Bar.

### INN AT IRISH HOLLOW

Galena

This pastoral paradise celebrates its 35th year. Hidden in the hills outside of town, the inn beckons with six private cottages, each generating its own vintage romantic vibe, but all blessed with gorgeous decor, focal-point fireplaces and spa-like baths. A stay includes a bountiful country breakfast (handmade with local, seasonal and natural ingredients) delivered to your door, a multicourse dinner one evening, and 500 acres of farm estate to roam-paths lead through pastures, forests, wildflower fields and wetlands. Or enjoy the view from your private screen porch.

### JAIL HILL INN

Galena

Spending time in the old Jo Daviess County lockup is anything but punishment innkeeper Matthew Carroll turned the four-story brick building into a maximumamenity bed-and-breakfast. Cramped, spartan quarters for the sheriff and inmates became six spacious, stylish suites with custom king beds, fireplaces, massaging bathtubs and dual-head showers. Savor gourmet breakfast in the dining room. (Or have it delivered.) Late afternoon brings wine and a tray of goodies. Galena's historic retail district is down the hill.

### THE RITZ-CARLTON

Chicago

You'll be puttin' on the ritz when you upgrade to a room or suite with Club Lounge access. The hotel's exclusive 15th-floor lounge offers complimentary food and beverages five times a day-breakfast, lunch, afternoon tea, hors d'oeuvres-cocktail time, and evening desserts-cordials. Club status also earns you a dedicated concierge team to help with dinner reservations and activities, plus in-room amenities, such as a shoeshine and same-day pressing of two garments.

### THE ST. REGIS CHICAGO

In 1904, the brand was first to install a telephone in every room. Today, use it to summon a personal butler who'll help you unpack, deliver free coffee and press your clothes. Dine on the terrace at Miru restaurant, share in a sunset champagne ritual and relax at The St. Regis Spa. The hotel resides in a 101-story Lakeshore East building, the world's tallest designed by a woman, Jeanne Gang. Floor-to-ceiling windows maximize views of the Chicago River, Navy Pier and Lake Michigan.

A Gothic Revival limestone building that once protected a standpipe now houses a gallery showing local artists' work.


### NAUVOO ILLINOIS TEMPLE

Delve into history and the humanities at the noncirculating library. Built in 1887, the free library offers tours four times a week.

### PEORIA RIVERFRONT MUSEUM

Peoria

An exhibit from guest curator Ken Burns brings a 1776 edition of the Declaration of Independence and other artifacts to Peoria for America's 250th anniversary.

### PULLMAN NATIONAL HISTORICAL PARK

Chicago

At the visitors center in the old clock tower, learn about the Pullman Company industrial community and the labor movement that started here.

# Big Plans on Campus

You don't have to be a student, parent or alum to enjoy these Illinois college towns.

Audit attractions on and off campus, including major spots to eat and drink.



### University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign


With nearly 60,000 students, it's one of the largest U.S. college campuses. Art enriches a vibrant culture.

As you tour the sprawling, bustling campus, relax and reflect in the Arboretum, an oasis of ornamental gardens that's particularly beautiful in fall. Krannert Art Museum is famous for its Andean, European and American art, plus its post-Modernist architecture. The Spurlock Museum celebrates cultures spanning the globe and historical eras, drawing on artifacts from six continents. Longtime Champaign eateries please college crowds: Murphy's Pub has served Irish fare since 1969, Golden Harbor started dishing up Chinese cuisine in 1996, and Papa Del's Pizza Factory rolled out its first pies in 1970. I Hotel and Illinois Conference Center is well situated for campus visitors, especially Fighting Illini football and basketball fans and concertgoers-it's just south of Memorial Stadium and State Farm Center.

### FOR FOOTBALL FANS

After the Fighting Illini's historically successful 2024 season—10 wins, a bowl game victory and a national ranking—expectations for 2025 are high.

SELFIE SPOT At the west entrance to campus, take a pic with beloved Alma Mater, a 5-ton bronze statue depicting a woman in academic robes.



Bordering Chicago along Lake Michigan, Chicago's North Shore is the perfect spot to base a Chicago visit with easy access to the city and North Shore attractions.

### Northwestern University, Evanston


The suburban Chicago school is serious about academics—and seriously close to Lake Michigan.

A campus visit should include Alice Millar Chapel, with its spectacular stained-glass windows. Dearborn Observatory is open for tours on Friday evenings-peer through the big telescope. Students hang out at Norris University Center, where there's a bookstore, dining and a Starbucks (aka Norbucks). The Block Museum of **Art** is free and open to all Wednesdays through Sundays. Look for an exhibit on Helen Frankenthaler's experimental prints. Near campus, reflect and meditate at Bahá'í House of Worship, the only one in North America; Hewn bakery masters the art of bread, pastries and sandwiches; Soul and Smoke tempts with bold barbecue; and Stacked and Folded plates fresh takes on burgers, tacos and wraps. Graduate by Hilton Evanston provides classy accommodations.


### FOR FOOTBALL FANS

While **Ryan Field** undergoes renovations, the Northwestern Wildcats will play two home games (November 15 and 22) at Chicago's **Wrigley Field.** 

**SELFIE SPOT** That which we call a rose grows in the **Shakespeare Garden**, which contains plants mentioned in The Bard's works.







**ILLINOIS INSIDER** The state has 70-plus four-year colleges and universities. The oldest public one is / Illinois State University, founded in 1857. Abraham Lincoln drafted the bond and bill of sale documents for the property that would become the university.







### Illinois State University, Bloomington-Normal

The state's first public university retains a smallcampus feel that fosters a strong sense of community.

History permeates campus and nearby attractions, including the David Davis Mansion, the Victorian home of Abraham Lincoln's close friend and political ally. Another impressive manor home from the 1920s, Ewing Cultural Center is surrounded by lush gardens. Discover more natural beauty on a walking tour of campus-Fell Arboretum features thousands of trees. Or take a walk on Constitution Trail, a 45-mile paved route through Bloomington-Normal. Hyatt Place **Bloomington-Normal** puts you close to campus and in the heart of the Uptown Normal district, where Medici beckons with an eclectic menu and a 30-foot mulberry tree that's inside the restaurant. Down the street, The Rock Restaurant rocks a Mediterranean vibe.

**SELFIE SPOT** Head to Redbird Plaza to find the school's Redbird mascot. It's a tradition to rub the beak.







### Southern Illinois University, Carbondale


Set near the Shawnee National Forest, SIU is an outdoor-oriented campus with a down-toearth disposition. Make Home2 Suites by Hilton Carbondale your base camp for on- and off-campus adventures. It's close to SIU and fixtures like Quatro's deep-pan pizza, opened in 1975 by four guys from Chicago, and Harbaugh's Cafe, the go-to place for a hearty breakfast or lunch since 2000. Relative newcomer Underground Public House

showcases artisanal meats, local produce, innovative cocktails and craft beers—owner-butcher Josh Klarer grew up in Carbondale. On campus, exhibits at the **Sharp Museum** cover the arts, sciences and humanities. See paintings, geological specimens, cultural artifacts and more. SIU's **Touch of Nature** education center offers

immersive outdoor experiences, including trails and lodging. It's a gateway to the wonders of the **Shawnee National Forest.** 

SELFIE SPOT A statue of three Salukis, the dog breed that serves as SIU's mascot, graces Saluki Alumni Plaza, on the lawn between Pulliam and Woody halls.

# A Day in Chicago's Little Village

Meander along this vibrant neighborhood's "Mexican Magnificent Mile" and areas nearby to encounter independent shops, cultural centers and restaurants.



ILLINOIS INSIDER Held annually, the 26th Street Mexican Independence

Day Parade (September 14) features colorful floats and lively cultural performances to kick off Hispanic Heritage Month celebrations.

Spanning West 26th Street with a welcoming *Bienvenidos*, the Little Village Arch announces a bustling commercial corridor. Hundreds of locally owned businesses, many rooted in the area's Latino heritage, make La Villita a shopping and dining destination for Spanish and English speakers alike. Often called the Mexico of the Midwest, neighborhood murals and spaces, like the Manuel Perez Jr. Memorial Plaza, celebrate community culture. Explore on your own or reserve a guided group walking tour, free through the Chicago Greeter program.

- 10:15 a.m. Chilaquiles stand out on the La Catedral Cafe and Restaurant menu, which features 16 varieties spanning spice levels. Toppings include scrambled eggs and chicken. On the sunny side? Brunch with an omelette poblano on Mi Tierra's expansive patio.
- 11 a.m. Fortified by fried tortillas, it's time to shop. Marvel at bedazzled quinceañera gowns on display at Alborada, or browse instruments and equipment at Ceasar's Music of Illinois. Hunt for deals on traditional embroidered fashions and jewelry at Discount Mall.
- 1:30 p.m. Sweet tooths should pop into
  Dulcelandia and fill a piñata with candies
  to savor later. Find Chicago's best conchas
  (Mexican sweet bread) at Rosy's Bakery.
  Popular El Churro Shop pairs fried churros
  with milkshakes and more.
- 2 p.m. Nonprofits like Open Center for the Arts cultivate creativity. The gallery hosts community workshops. Pick up an array of local handicrafts, including Day of the Dead accessories, at Artesanías Elena near the Manuel Perez Jr. Memorial Plaza.
- 3:30 p.m. Collections at nearby Pilsen's
  National Museum of Mexican Art (free!)
  represent both sides of the border, from preCuauhtémoc Meso-American artifacts to
  contemporary works that include paintings,
  textiles, photography, sculpture and
  performance art.
- 6 p.m. Back in Little Village at Nuevo Leon Restaurant, Laura Gutierrez-Ramos continues a family tradition of warm service and fresh flour tortillas made from nearby El Milagro. Order the legendary refried beans, vegan-friendly from the restaurant, which opened in 1977.
- 8 p.m. Start the party with a pitcher of El Palomaso at Osito's Tap, a modern Latinx speakeasy. Then, shimmy to La Cueva Nightclub, Chicago's oldest Latino drag bar. Recover with rice and bean burritos from Yolanda's Restaurant, open 24/7.









Recognized for her groundbreaking beauty brands, this creative visionary traces her unfussy aesthetic and global success to core values instilled during her suburban Chicago upbringing.

When Bobbi Brown asks women, "What do you see when you look in the mirror?" the cosmetics founder hopes responses go more than skin deep. Her compelling question invites real, honest reflection. Brown wants to know what gives women confidence.

Whether chatting with notable guests for her Jones Road Beauty YouTube television series, *I Am Me*, or developing revolutionary products, Brown seeks opportunities to learn and grow. Since launching her first lipstick line in 1990, her quest has empowered generations to embrace a natural look.

Now 68, the Wilmette native tells her story in her memoir, *Still Bobbi*, out this September. Brown's "Midwest nice" attitude advances her inspirational journey to becoming a makeup artist, mother of three grown boys and multi-hyphenate entrepreneur. Friendly conversations connected Brown with a chemist, press coverage and distribution opportunities that eventually established her as an icon in the industry.

Brown now lives in New Jersey, where she and her husband, Steven Plofker, renovated The George, a boutique hotel. Her career recently came full circle with a brick-and-mortar store, Jones Road Beauty, opening in Chicago's Bucktown neighborhood. We asked Brown where her passion for beauty was born, who served as early mentors and what's ahead for her.

# **A Style** Icon's Chicago

### Q Are your Chicago roots still strong?

A My whole family is still in Chicago, so I visit often. I loved growing up in Wilmette. There were tons of kids in my neighborhood, lots of green space, and we were still minutes away from the city. It was the ideal place to grow up. Chicago is a critical part of my origin story. No matter where my life or career has taken me, I've always tried to remain down-to-earth and authentic to who I am. I'm still Bobbi, a 5-foot-tall Jewish girl from the Chicago suburbs.

### Q Were you always interested in cosmetics?

A My mom, Sandra, was the most glamorous woman. She dressed perfectly, and her dark hair was always beautifully coiffed. When she and my dad were getting ready to go out, I would watch her get dressed and do her makeup. She sparked my passion for teaching women how to use makeup-not only to make themselves look more beautiful, but so they feel more confident.

### O How did you turn that early fascination into your influential career?

A I was not a great student. I was struggling to find my way at a traditional college. When I was home one summer complaining that I didn't want to go back to school, my mom asked me: If it was your birthday and you could do anything you wanted to do, what would it be?

I answered that I wanted to go and play with the makeup in the beauty department of Marshall Field's. I loved to watch the sales associates and makeup artists working with customers. I paid close attention to how they spoke to women and the way they taught them how to use products.

My mom suggested I find a college that would allow me to study makeup. Emerson College in Boston let me create my own major. I studied photography and theatrical makeup there.

### Q What beauty looks did you embrace as a teen?

A When I was growing up in the '60s and '70s, the ideal was actresses and models who were all tall, blonde and blue-eyed. Then in 1970 came Ali MacGraw in Love Story. She was a beautiful, dark-haired girl with full eyebrows and natural makeup. It was the first time I saw someone who looked like me, with my aesthetic, portrayed in popular culture.

### O If you could give your younger self in Wilmette advice, what would you tell her?

A Breathe. Go slowly because nothing changes overnight. Find your small posse of friends who will hype you up or give you honest feedback when you

### Q Although you haven't lived in Chicago for decades, do you feel its influence?

A I think it's important for people to realize that you are where you came from, and I'm proud that I'm from Chicago. Chicago is bursting with art, incredible architecture and a strong sense of community. You find beauty everywhere you look. It also has a clean, almost industrial feel, which has inspired my design aesthetic. My style is like Chicago: clean and simple with a pop of color. The best part of Chicago, though, is the people. Midwesterners are authentic, approachable and

practical. That approach to life and work has guided me. To me, beauty should be easy and effective. Makeup should make you look like yourself on your very best day.

### Who were your early mentors?

A My family. Our Midwestern values of being authentic, honest and keeping things simple have informed my life and career. My grandfather, Papa Sam, had car dealerships throughout Chicago. Everyone called him Cadillac Sam. I consider him to be the best businessman and entrepreneur I've known. My Dad, Joe, retired from law to become a children's author. Now in his 90s, he's still writing and takes boxing lessons twice a week. My Aunt Alice has been my go-to person throughout my career. I even gave her an advice column when I was the editor of Yahoo Beauty.

### Q Tell us about your fragrance line.

A Our first scent, Shower, smells so clean and fresh. BKLYN, our second fragrance, gives off an air of casual confidence with notes of lemon, neroli oil and sandalwood. Brooklyn-a borough of Manhattan known for being cool without trying-is the inspiration.

### Q You've written nine books. What made you want to write your memoir, Still Bobbi?

A I absolutely love the process of creating content that helps women look and feel better about themselves. I have always shared tidbits about my life and career on my social media channels, but my previous books have all been instructional. I haven't told my full story all in one place until now. I'm hoping Still Bobbi urges readers to embrace their own potential and pursue their dreams with confidence and clarity of purpose.





## Speakeasy-Style

In downtown Galena, Amelia's Under the **Lamplight Dinner** 

Theater pairs a supper-club atmosphere with interactive entertainment. Comedy shows fill weekend nights with laughter and intrigue, and everyone is a suspect during the themed murder mystery dinners. After dessert, stick around for a ghost tour.

### Rebuilt Red Cattle Barn

Goodfield has enjoyed decades of cornfield-adjacent performances, a history that dates back to Halloween 1975, when the fledgling dinner theater's tables were built mere hours before the debut production. The latest iteration of its venue, The Barn III, is an ideal

spot for a birthday or anniversary-celebrations that earn you a classic, whipped-cream-covered barn cake. Plan your visit for productions of Arsenic and Old Lace (October 3-November 2) and Plaid Tidings (November 15-December 31).

### Ornate Historic Venue

The three-story Art Deco Fort Armstrong Theatre opened in 1921, originally as a downtown movie house for silent films, in Rock Island. More than a century later, Circa '21 Dinner Playhouse calls the grand theater home, hosting more than 250 productions since it took over in 1977. The best part? Along with dinner, your ticket actually

earns two performances: a preshow from the singing waitstaff, the Bootleggers, and the main production. Upcoming shows include several Broadway favorites, including Come From Away (September 10-November 1).

### **Upscale Circus** Atmosphere

Teatro ZinZanni's eyecatching, circus-inspired spectacle awaits inside an antique Belgian Spiegeltent (a large tent with mirrors) in Chicago's Theatre District. Don't miss a moment as you savor your four-course meal: a trapeze duo soaring overhead and an aerial artist keeping multiple hoops spinning as she ascends toward the ceiling. Back on the ground, acclaimed singers, dancers and improvisational artists do their part to deliver a show you won't soon forget.

### State Park Wood-Beam Lodge

Tunes from your favorite bands and artists have drawn crowds to the White Pines Lodge Playhouse Theater since 1989 in Mount Morris, and this year is no different. Pair a lunch buffet with tribute acts performing the best of Barry Manilow and Johnny Cash. In December, catch matinee or evening performances of a White Pines tradition: Scrooge the Comedy, an outlandish, comical take on the Dickens classic that relies on audience participation.





Thirsty for nature and movement? Follow the sound of flowing water across the state to these select trails promising cascading payoffs.

A little leg work can make a waterfall all the more rewarding. In **Ferne Clyffe State Park**, a spectrum of lush moss paints the rocky perimeter of a 60-foot intermittent cascade. You can find more than 700 species of plants along the trails in this protected nook in Southern Illinois. Also in the region, the sandstone gorge of **Jackson Falls** lures hikers, horseback riders and technical rock climbers for day trips and camping. Contact **Hiking with Shawn** for in-depth, guided excursions pairing local wisdom with scenic wonder across the Shawnee Hills region.

Let the water-carved contours in stone lead you to French Canyon or 17 other captivating canyons at **Starved Rock State Park** in Oglesby. At least 10 of the canyons feature seasonal waterfalls in Illinois' most popular park. Early risers find stillness among the birds and trickling waters tracing new paths through rock. Book a Fall Color Trolley Tour at **Starved Rock Lodge** for a hot lunch, trolley ride and guided walk to a few iconic park features. Or try the Ghost Tours (October) for a rare after-dark experience with a guide sharing paranormal history and lore.

Giant's Bathtub, Lake Falls and Cascade Falls each make stunning destinations along the 1-mile-long canyon in **Matthiessen State**Park in Oglesby. Water erosion formed the sandstone geological wonderland, which is divided between an upper and a lower section. Visitors can traverse the dynamic terrain on foot, horseback or mountain bikes via 9 miles of multiuse trails.

The combined prairies, savannas and oak-maple woodlands of **Waterfall Glen Forest Preserve** near Lemont hold nearly 750 native plant species. Stop for a photo at the tiered falls, built by the Civilian Conservation Corps in the 1930s, then hike above Sawmill Creek. The natural sanctuary even has a model airplane field and a canoe route.






# comforts, buy a hot meal or rent a cabin at the park lodge. Newcomers to trekking or the region especially appreciate the expertise of Bart Lane with Shawnee Guided Hiking Tours, offering half-day and full-day guided trips. Autumn leaves steal the seasonal show in Shawnee's Little Grand Canyon. The walls of this ancient box canyon soar 300 feet overhead as you traverse through a bottomland forest. # WOODED

These ancient forest destinations promise to make you slow down and look up, learning from sturdy giants that started growing before we had electricity.


Forest- and water-lovers get the best of both worlds in Cache River State Natural Area. Here in Southern Illinois, ancient cypress trees grow straight out of the river. This stretch of the Cache River claims North America's northernmost cypress forest, while marking the start of the Gulf Coastal Plainspanning 500-plus miles to the Gulf. Get up close and personal with the towering giants on a guided trip with Cache Bayou Outfitters (through November) if you want to be sure to meet the oldest, dazzling cypress, estimated at more than 1,000 years old.


Precious few tracts of old-growth forest remain in the U.S. east of the Mississippi River. Beall Woods State Park preserves one of them along the banks of the Wabash River near Mount Carmel. The so-called University of Trees shows off its hickories, bottomland oaks and other supersized deciduous hardwoods year-round.

At another Illinois old-growth tract, St. Francis Woods boasts some white oaks that sprouted before the birth of the U.S. Combined with a colorful lineup of other beloved natives, the trees create a gorgeous backdrop to the park's lake, part of the Independence Grove Forest Preserve in Libertyville.

Try some forest bathing beneath a canopy of American sycamores, shagbarks, oaks and silver maples in Allerton Park. This old-growth beacon near Monticello shares parkland with intricate gardens and a historic mansion, where visitors can spend the night. The forest is part of the homelands of several Indigenous tribes.

Learning the basics of plant identification, frog behavior or maple sugaring takes on immersive (and delicious) layers at Pilcher Park Nature Center in Joliet. The log cabin education center is just the entry point alongside unique old-growth forests, miles of trails and Native American mounds.







urrounded by brightly colored canvases, Preston Jackson exudes creative energy. The renowned artist and performer is back in his studio after refreshing one of his most celebrated works, *Bronzeville to Harlem: An American Story.* "I think of it as a living piece," Jackson says of the sculptural installation at Peoria Riverfront Museum. "It's like it's talking to me, and each season seems to be a different kind of conversation."

The small-scale cityscape features hundreds of unique bronze and steel buildings, figures and fixtures. Each is carefully positioned to suggest stories found in urban centers, from the Midwest to Manhattan. Jackson's own family moved to central Illinois as part of the Great Migration (1910–1970). The characters that spring from his imagination share his ancestors' struggle for equality and hope for the future.

As a young boy growing up in Decatur, Jackson's artistic talents helped him stand out among 10 siblings. Yet he wasn't always certain he could financially sustain himself with his artwork. He recalls following in his father's footsteps as a foundry worker before eventually graduating with his M.F.A. from the University of Illinois. "I began to grow intellectually," he says. "That's something I take pride in, because growth of that type leaves an open door so you can go even further."

Landing faculty roles at Western Illinois University and the School of the Art Institute of Chicago also widened Jackson's experiences and influenced his artistic development. "Teaching, you learn, especially from your students," he says.

Jackson's rising recognition and influence afforded him more opportunities, which he paid forward to his local creative community. In 1995, he opened The Raven Gallery and founded the Contemporary Art Center in Peoria. Three years later, Jackson was selected as a laureate of the Lincoln Academy of Illinois for his creative contributions. But he isn't resting on those laurels.

At 81, the career artist and educator continues seeking new experiences. He strives to make a statement and share his dreams through massive works and layered paintings. Also an accomplished guitarist, Jackson takes a jazz musician's approach across mediums. He likens his curiosity to a hungry cat. "It's all creativity," Jackson says. "Poetry and music, to me, are very close. They're woven together."

Often commissioned to design commemorative public art in Illinois and beyond, he's known for creating works that reflect his perspective and help reveal forgotten stories. He aims to distill complex ideas into geometric shapes and organic forms people can understand and interpret.

"It's more demanding now, but my art is one of the tools that I use to make the world better," Jackson says. "It's like lighting a candle or a spark. The artist initiates that awareness, and then [the viewer] takes it from there."



Midcentury mod. Craftsman. Queen Anne. Greek Revival. If an architectural style was built between the Civil War and the early 20th century, you'll likely find an example of it in historic Quincy.

This Mississippi River town includes four National Register Historic Districts and more than 3,600 structures on the National Register of Historic Places. One intersection (16th and Maine) captures four worldclass architectural styles, including Richardsonian Romanesque. The style, named for architect Henry Hobson Richardson, conveys a sense of grandeur through the use of rough-cut stone, rounded arches, contrasting colors and medieval-inspired embellishments. A prime example is the Newcomb-Stillwell Mansion, which now houses The Quincy Museum (shown).


Explore the magnificent 20,800-square-foot home's first floor before heading upstairs to discover dinosaurs, Mississippi wildlife and Native American exhibits. The museum and about a dozen other significant structures are part of the self-guided Maine Street Mile: Quincy's Most Notable Thoroughfare tour. Check out other neighborhoods on a bike; the first two hours are free though Bike Quincy.

# OUTDOOR ACTIVITIES, GALENA


The hills surrounding Galena, in the northwestern tip of the state, are home to two family-friendly resorts that shine in winter. Skiers and snowboarders will find plenty of downhill thrills at Chestnut Mountain Resort, and novices can build their skills in group, private and kid-centric "Powder Pups" lessons. The on-site Summit Food and Spirits has hearty après-ski fare, local craft beers and views of the Mississippi. Fifteen miles north, at Eagle Ridge Resort and Spa, there's sledding, an outdoor iceskating rink and snowshoe trails along the shores of Lake Galena, as well as Swedish massages and Hydrafacials at the recently remodeled Stonedrift Spa.

Downtown Galena's well-preserved, 19thcentury redbrick storefronts are filled with inviting specialty shops. Browse for women's clothes; grab a cup of coffee and homemade gelato at Elle and Becks Lifestyle Boutique; pick up Organic Lavender Hand and Body Wash or Patchouli Hand and Body Wash at Galena Apothecary; and check out gifts and home decor at Isabella's Ltd. and kitchenware at The Grateful Gourmet. When happy hour hits, head to the threestory Galena Cellars to taste Cabernet Franc, honey mead and sparkling wines made at the family-run vineyard outside of town. European dishes star on the menus of two of the town's most popular restaurants: Fritz and Frites features German schnitzel and French roast chicken, and Fried Green Tomatoes is known for its lasagna and seafood pasta, served in the 1826 redbrick Dowling House, the oldest house in Galena.









# ON STAGE

# LIVE THEATER, CHICAGO

Chicago is known for its vibrant theater and live-performance scene, and the upcoming season is no exception. A Beautiful Noise, about singer Neil Diamond, is playing at the Cadillac Palace Theatre (November 1–30), plus Phantom of the Opera (December 11–February 1) and The Outsiders (February 10–22). The Joffrey Ballet company presents holiday favorite The Nutcracker at Lyric Opera House (December 5–28). Comedylovers can catch a show nearly every night, whether they're in the mood for improv at The Second City or fine-tuned stand-up acts at Zanies Comedy Club Chicago.

There are opportunities to stand on center stage yourself as well. You can go behind the scenes on tours of **The Chicago Theatre**, where the six-story-high marquee has beckoned visitors since 1921, and **The Auditorium**, an 1889 National Historic Landmark that's hosted U.S. presidents

Teddy Roosevelt and Bill Clinton, and stars like Jimi Hendrix and Aretha Franklin.

Centrally located between these two historic auditoriums—and just two blocks from the Art Institute of Chicago and Millennium Park—the Palmer House, a Hilton Hotel makes a good base camp for seeing shows. The Palmer House is the country's longest continuously operating hotel. Nearby Petterino's is an Italian-American mainstay, while The Grillroom Chophouse and Winebar specializes in steak.

ILLINOIS INSIDER You can score discounted / tickets to Broadway musicals, comedy shows and more through Hot Tix, a service that supports the nonprofit League of Chicago Theatres. This is a great option for last-minute Chicago trips, as tickets often become available for week-of shows.

### EYES ON EAGLES

### BIRD-WATCHING, ALTON AND GRAFTON

Every winter, just north of St. Louis, a set of Illinois River towns welcomes a skyful of celebrity guests. Hundreds of American bald eagles, as well as trumpeter swans, snowy owls, ducks and geese, migrate here from December through early March.

**Pere Marquette Lodge** offers a special eagle package that includes meals (the on-site restaurant is beloved for its fried chicken), overnight accommodation and access to

12 miles of wooded trails where eagles often nest nearby. Another good bet for spying the birds of prey is walking across the mile-long, pedestrians-only **Chain of Rocks Bridge** from Granite City over the Mississippi. If you'd rather bird-watch by car, cruise the riverside **Great River Road**, where eagles' 8-foot wingspans are often visible overhead. For a closer look, visit the free **TreeHouse Wildlife Center**, home to five rescued bald eagles, along with foxes, bobcats and snakes.

If all of this puts you in the mood to fly through the air yourself, head to **Aerie's Resort** in Grafton, where you can zoom down hairpin turns on the 4,000-footlong Alpine Coaster. **The Terrace at** 

Aerie's Resort has river-bluff views for a great lodging and dining experience. In Alton, Old Bakery Beer Company pours a North American lager they dub Eagle Beer.



Mark your calendar for the free Alton Eagle Ice Festival (mid-January), an annual twoday celebration with live music, an eagle meet and greet, food trucks and an ice-carving competition.





# WATER PARK AND SHOPPING, GURNEE

In the winter, any place in the Midwest that's kept at a balmy 84 degrees is going to be appealing. Add in waterslides, a lazy river and a kid-friendly wave pool, and **Great Wolf Lodge** in Gurnee is a clear family favorite. The suites are spacious and on-site, so you can maximize time exploring the water park.

Nearby, **Gurnee Mills** is the biggest outlet mall in the state, with some 200 stores, including Bass Pro Shops, Nike and Lego.
And it's far from just a shopping hub. You'll also find an indoor ice-skating rink, an escape room and the Rainforest Cafe, a kid-centric restaurant with animatronic jungle creatures and a talking tree named Tracy who greets guests. **Launch Family Entertainment,** an indoor trampoline park, is just down the road.

A local hot spot, **Primo Italian American Cuisine**, charbroils steaks in an
1,800-degree oven; the steaks are seasoned
with homemade lavender garlic sea salt. The
extensive menu also features Italian classics
and seafood—save room for the flourless
chocolate cake. Steak and seafood are the
focus at **Stevens**, a local family-owned
option with live music on weekends.

# NATURE, MAKANDA

The River to River Trail spans 160 miles across Southern Illinois, from the Ohio to the Mississippi rivers, through the Shawnee National Forest. You can trek one of its most scenic stretches outside the town of Makanda, where a wooded 3-mile portion of the trail connects two tranquil lodges—both ideal for a weekend retreat.

The **Makanda Inn** sits on 18 acres of peaceful forest, with a creek running nearby. Known as an eco-retreat, the property was made using sustainable materials and methods. The spacious lodge has a 32-foothigh stone fireplace, knotty-pine ceiling and five guest suites. Three standalone cottages

have living roofs with grass and plants, plus plenty of creature comforts: king-size beds, 600-thread-count sheets and soaking tubs. Breakfast is included, and children under 13 aren't permitted at the inn.

At the other end of the hike, you'll find the Giant City Nature Trail and the Giant City Lodge, built from sandstone and white-oak timber in the 1930s by the Civilian Conservation Corps. The lodge has 34 cabins available to rent seasonally, from the first Friday of February through mid-December, along with on-site restaurant Bald Knob Dining Room, which serves breakfast, lunch and dinner daily. The hearty meals seem

designed with long-haul hikers in mind the fried-chicken dinner, hickory-smoked barbecue chicken feast, Friday fish fry and family-style breakfast are all-you-can-eat.

The old-fashioned and friendly vibe extends to Makanda, where the 1890-era Makanda Boardwalk is lined with art galleries and a country store. You'll find more food-and-drink options in nearby Carbondale. Buckwater Brew Works and Whiskey House has live music and more than 300 whiskeys and scotches to sample, while Branch Cafe and Bakery specializes in house-made scones, cakes and muffins, and some vegetarian and vegan options.



# Oak Park Area

With its world-famous architecture and storied past, Oak Park-Chicago's longtime next-door neighbor—has the "Wright" stuff for a getaway focused on connecting with history and nature.

Oak Park borders Chicago on the west, 9 miles from downtown. The

Great Chicago Fire of 1871 played an important role in the village's growth and history, as it pushed people into the suburbs. For a young architect named Frank Lloyd Wright, he felt it offered a balance between urban life and nature. Wright built a home in Oak Park, and also designed more than two dozen structures around town, including the pioneering Laura Gale House, which foreshadowed his iconic Fallingwater in Pennsylvania. In 1898, Wright built his studio in Oak Park. One year later and half a mile away, Ernest Hemingway was born.

Today, the Oak Park area beckons Chicago visitors for a side trip that's easy to make by car, L train (Green Line) or Metra train. In addition to visiting Wright-designed buildings, architecture aficionados and history buffs can explore Riverside, a planned community designed by landscape architect Frederick Law Olmsted, and take a There Goes the Neighbor Hood bus tour of gangsters' homes in Oak Park and River Forest. Families gravitate to Brookfield Zoo Chicago in nearby Brookfield for animal adventures, and nature-lovers take their pick of parks and trails. In the Oak Park Arts **District**, art appreciators find galleries and boutiques with a creative bent.

#### DO

The new James and Elizabeth Bramsen Tropical Forests habitat at **Brookfield Zoo Chicago** mimics the natural homes of gorillas, orangutans and monkeys.

What kind of home does a renowned architect design for his family? See for yourself at the Frank Lloyd Wright Home and Studio. Wright's Unity Temple, a concrete church, is nearby.

At the Ernest Hemingway Birthplace Museum, tour the Queen Anne Victorian home where "Papa" was born to his mama, Grace.

#### EAT

In a renovated 1919 bank with a rooftop terrace, One Lake Brewing crafts beers (like imperial stout Been Czar, Done That) and elevated pub bites.

Invoking Oak Park's original name (Joseph and Betty Kettlestrings settled the area), Kettlestrings **Grove** evokes a speakeasy spirit with its cocktails, charcuterie and small plates.

#### STAY

For a boutique hotel experience close to historical attractions. book The Carleton of Oak Park. They also offer an economical Motor Inn adjacent to the hotel.

#### ILLINOIS INSIDER

Exotic plants and native flora vie for eyes at Oak Park Conservatory, an urban oasis. Tour the Mediterranean Room, Tropical Room and Desert Room, plus outdoor gardens.

#### DO

Plow through a hands-on history of farming at the John Deere Pavilion in Moline. Sit in the cab of machines big and small and drive heavy equipment simulators. Cruise the Mississippi River aboard the Celebration Belle, a paddle-wheeler that departs from Moline (through October).

#### EAT

Indulge in a hot fudge sundae at Lagomarcino's ice cream parlor in Molineit's been downtown since 1908. They make chocolates in-house and serve deli sandwiches too. Coffeeinfused Uncommon Stout is a fave at Bent River Brewing Company in Moline and Rock Island. Pair their craft beer with a Get Bent burger, BBQ wings or fried pickle chips.

#### STAY

Timeless character and modern comforts merge in The Axis Hotel, which offers boutique rooms in Moline's ornate 1927 Fifth Avenue Building. Experience open-concept, eco-friendly design at Element Moline, set in a 1917 warehouse. Rooms feature kitchens, high-end beds and spa baths. Get your game-and glamon at Bally's Quad Cities Casino and Hotel in Rock Island. Swank suites suit high rollers.

# **Quad Cities Region**

A river runs through the Quad Cities, a storied region straddling two states. The Illinois side holds military and ag history, plus outdoor rec and tempting flavors.



Anchored by an east-west bend in the Mississippi River, the Quad Cities region includes the Illinois towns of Rock Island, Moline and East Moline. With Interstate-74, I-80 and I-88 converging in the area, it's easy to reach by car. Rock Island is the namesake of the river's largest isle, now called Arsenal Island, as well as the famed Rock Island Line railroad. Arsenal Island is home to the Rock Island Arsenal, a large and active U.S. Army installation that provides equipment and services to all the armed forces. The island also encompasses several historic buildings, military cemeteries and a museum. The Arsenal's golf course,

dating to 1897, recently reopened after a six-year hiatus. You'll need a visitor pass (available on-site) to play. At the island's Mississippi River Visitor Center, watch barges navigate Lock and Dam 15.

Moline is headquarters for farm equipment giant John Deere. Take a new self-guided tour, the John Deere Trail, to explore the company's local heritage. With help from your phone, you can stop and interact with more than a dozen sites connected to Deere and Company. Also worth following is the 62-mile Great River Trail. Hop on it from Rock Island's Schwiebert Riverfront Park, where spectacular views await.

# Amish Country

In Illinois Amish Country, members of the ultratraditional faith community coexist peacefully with modern society, the two worlds sharing an appreciation for handcrafted furniture and small entrepreneurial businesses.

Time travel isn't science fiction in Illinois Amish Country. Amish folks live, farm and work in the countryside surrounding the village of Arthur. Visiting here takes you back to an era when farmers worked the land with teams of horses, artisans crafted beautiful things with their hands, and horse-drawn buggies carried people from place to place. The Amish community surrounding Arthur is the oldest and largest in Illinois. Started in 1865 by a few families, it has grown to include more than 4,500 people. The nearby towns of Arcola, Sullivan and Tuscola serve as gateways to the Amish area.

Farming is still the main way of life for the Amish, but they've also developed cottage industries like baking and furniture making. In Arthur, you can buy handcrafted Amish furniture at The Wood Loft, and in Arcola, shop Yoder's Homestead Shop and Kauffman Amish Furniture Outlet. Along with Amish farms and businesses on the outskirts, you'll find shops and restaurants in downtown Arthur. Just be careful: As you drive in Amish Country, watch out for black buggies, farm equipment and bicycles. Slow down and enjoy your journey back in time.





#### DO

Pick and grin at **The Great Pumpkin Patch,** south of
Arthur, where 300 global
varieties of pumpkins,
squash and gourds grow
on a family farm. Navigate
mazes and eat pumpkin
ice cream. See the oldest
Amish dwelling in Illinois,
the 1865 Moses Yoder
House, and other historic
structures at the **Illinois Amish Heritage Center**east of Arthur. A new
museum is in the works.

#### EAT

Hand-dipped chocolates and homemade ice cream satisfy sweet tooths at Flesor's Candy Kitchen in Tuscola, founded in 1901 and reopened in 2004. Anna Herschberger, owner of Yoder's Kitchen in Arthur, was raised in an Amish home and learned to cook from her mother. Enjoy a hearty buffet.

#### STAY

Green Mill Village Hotel
and Suites in Arcola,
part of the BW Signature
Collection, offers free
breakfast, a heated indoor
pool and a 24-hour exercise
facility. Right off I-57, the
Holiday Inn Express in
Tuscola provides the
same modern comforts,
plus it's pet-friendly.

Anna promises affordable upscale dining. Build a meal around fried catfish fillets with lemon-caper aioli or hand-cut grilled pork chops with goat cheese butter. Dutch babies are a fave at The Iron Whisk, a breakfast and lunch spot in Cobden. The puffed pancakes, cooked in an iron skillet, are a cross between omelettes and crepes.

#### STAY

Suites at Davie School Inn in Anna feature king beds, whirlpool tubs, kitchenettes and chalkboards from the building's former life. The Skoolie, a rental near Vienna, packs a living room, dining area, full bed and bath (with shower) into a school bus parked near Shawnee National Forest.

# Southern Illinois

Go back to school in Southern Illinois—vou'll learn a lot, but no grades or homework, and you can spend recess exploring a giant natural playground.

Getting schooled is actually fun in Southern Illinois, where recreation and education meet at several of the region's top attractions. The longtime Alto Pass Grade School, built in 1928, now houses pottery studio Alto Clay Works.

A field trip to Saline Creek Pioneer Village Museum in Harrisburg is an engaging introductory course on local history. The site includes a one-room schoolhouse. Davie School Inn in Anna offers luxury stays in a 1910 building that served elementary students for nearly 90 years. And the Skoolie near Vienna is a Blue Bird school bus converted into an A-plus Airbnb.

The region has working schools, too, most notably Southern Illinois University in Carbondale. Its cultural curriculum for visitors includes art at the Sharp Museum, drama in McLeod Theater, concerts at Shryock Auditorium, botany at Marberry Arboretum, and phys ed (D1 college sports) in SIU Arena. At recess time, play in nearby Shawnee National Forest, with bluffs, waterfalls and lakes beloved by hikers, anglers and wildlife watchers. A highlight is Garden of the Gods, a stretch of rock formations nature started sculpting more than 320 million years ago.

Drink a Chambourcin, Chocolate Milk Stout or Vienna Lager at Von Jakob Winery and Brewery in Alto Pass, along the Shawnee Wine Trail. Enjoy lunch and dinner (weekends) too.

## TRAVELER INFORMATION

#### DRIVING IN ILLINOIS

Illinois highways and roads are well maintained and provide posted signage for drivers, so taking a road trip is a breeze. Chicago is a day's drive or less from major cities including Cincinnati, Cleveland, Detroit, Indianapolis, Kansas City, Milwaukee, Minneapolis, Pittsburgh, St. Louis and Toronto.

State law requires you to wear a seatbelt when traveling by car. Speed limits are posted in miles per hour (mph) and vary between 70 mph on rural interstates and freeways and 45 mph on urban interstates and freeways.

You may not use your cell phone for texting while driving, and you must use hands-free technology to make calls.

#### ILLINOIS TOLLWAYS

Some northern Illinois highways require tolls for use. Rates vary; not all toll plazas have attendants. Electronic toll collection is available through I-PASS or any transponder that's part of the E-ZPass system.

Drivers who miss tolls have 14 days to pay online. Note the license plate number, date, time and locations of unpaid tolls—that information will be required when submitting payments online.

#### REST AREAS AND WELCOME CENTERS

The state of Illinois serves drivers with 53 rest areas and 11 welcome centers, located on highways throughout the state. Open 24 hours a day, they offer restroom facilities, picnic areas, lighted walkways, maps, security cameras and parking for recreational vehicles, among other services. For locations, visit *idot.illinois.gov* 

#### ARRIVING BY PLANE

Domestic travelers can fly direct to destinations including Belleville, Bloomington-Normal, Champaign-Urbana, Decatur, Marion, Moline, Peoria, Quincy, Rockford and Springfield, as well as Chicago.

Once you land at either of Chicago's two major airports, Chicago Transit Authority trains can get you downtown. For info, go to *transitchicago.com* 

Regular shuttles to many Chicago downtown hotels leave from each airport. You can also get a taxi or rideshare. For more information on getting to and from Chicago's airports (including renting vehicles or arranging car services), visit flychicago.com

#### From O'Hare International

Airport, the Blue Line elevated train (known as the L) takes passengers to downtown Chicago in about 45 minutes. Follow the CTA Trains or Trains to City signs at the airport. If you arrive at the international terminal, follow the signs to the Airport Transit System, where you can get a free ride to Terminal 2 and then catch the L into the city.

#### From Chicago Midway International Airport, the

CTA Orange Line L train takes about 25 minutes to get to downtown Chicago.

#### OTHER TRANSIT AROUND CHICAGO

Metra runs commuter rail services from downtown Chicago to outlying suburbs and surrounding cities. For maps, schedules, alerts and more, visit metra.com

#### 21 AND OLDER

Legal statewide, alcohol, gambling and other substance use by adults may vary by city or municipality.



If you drink, don't drive. Instead, hail a cab or use a rideshare app. The state's legal limit for blood alcohol is 0.08.


