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














# WOODS AND WATERS



#### **ALL THE FALL FEELS**

To borrow from the American poet Carl Sandburg, fall comes on little cat feet. It sneaks in, silently painting the country side, then moves on. Maximize this brief yet beautiful season in Michigan, where the air and leaves are crisp and the waterways and colors are captivating. Take a drive, go on a hike or boat ride, or just bask in the glory of a perfect of ay. You might feel something profound. Nostalgia? Peace? You'll at least wish the moment could last.







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## Nature's Tumples

Waterfalls, one of nature's most beloved wonders, reign in Marquette County, home to more than 75 named falls. Venture away from Lake Superior to take in the captivating cascades that hide between the trees and off the beaten path.

**EASY** The family- and pet-friendly Wright Street Falls access is a 10-minute drive from downtown Marquette. Two short trails both lead to the rapids tumbling over volcanic rock in the Dead River. The slightly more challenging BLP Rocks trail promises a more complete view.

**MODERATE** Plan for nearly 3 miles on foot round-trip to witness 20-foot-tall Morgan Falls. The wooded hike follows a dirt road that's closed to motorized

vehicles, except for snowmobiles. A remote adventure to Yellow Dog Falls starts with a rugged approach road. After parking where Yellow Dog River crosses the road, hike less than a mile downstream to the main attraction, plus smaller cascades below.

ADVANCED

#### Finding the trailhead to Pinnacle Falls is half the challenge on the isolated back roads southwest of Big Bay. A 1.5-mile round-trip hike includes some steep climbs to the impressive waterfall and swirling pools below the namesake rocky pinnacle. Endurance junkies love Little Garlic Falls,

touting a nearly 8-mile

round-trip hike.







A network of hiking trails leads to panoramic vistas, some with a watery horizon and rugged forest.

EASY In the city, Tourist Park's wooded campground abuts the 3-mile North Country Trail and NTN. Trek east to Lake Superior or west along the Dead River to the North Trails of the NTN, connecting miles of marked trails. Farther north and minutes from Big Bay, the short ADA-accessible loop at Thomas Rock Scenic Overlook features a stunning horizon while catering to all, even leashed dogs.

**MODERATE** Less than a mile from bottom to top sounds easy enough at Sugarloaf Mountain. But you may break a sweat on the 300-plus stairsteps to the highest outlook with views of Lake Superior. A 1.6-mile section of the inter-state North Country Trail connects Wetmore Landing to Little Presque Isle Point, passing rocky beaches and cliffs.

**ADVANCED** After braving twisty trails, swampy areas and a steep rock face, hikers on **Hogback Mountain** claim a picturesque payoff: miles-long views of the city and Lake Superior.





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#### STAY AND DINE

Preserving the natural world is a priority at Bodega, where the sauces, breads and even bar infusions are made from scratch, and food waste gets composted. The Delft Bistro pairs world flavors, like lamb vindaloo, with local ingredients inside a 100-year-old reclaimed theater. Farmhouse ales and barrel-aged beer shine at the family-owned Barrel and Beam, now with the delicious addition of Northwoods Test Kitchen deli on-site.

The aptly named Landmark Inn building has hosted downtown guests since 1930, including many historical figures. Tastefully renovated boutique rooms and suites capitalize on timeless views of Lake Superior and Main Street charm beneath the sixth-floor Crow's Nest bar.





# Nature's Biking Pa

**Q** FROM TOP Iron Ore Heritage Trail; The Delft

Bistro

Traverse crests and valleys, perfect for pedalers from newbie to pro.

**EASY** Saddle up on a road bike, electric bike or other ride of choice for the multiuse Iron Ore Heritage Trail. It touts 47 miles, dreamy expanses of Lake Superior and nine trailheads linking multiple towns from downtown Marquette.

#### MODERATE

The newly rebranded NTN played a key role in putting Marquette on the international map for mountain biking. Weave along the Dead River in the north section with 30 miles of singletrack, or follow 45 miles in the south section to waterfalls and more technical purpose-built flow trails.

#### ADVANCED

Volunteers handcleared more than 75 miles that make up the RAMBA (Range Area Mountain Bike Association) trail system. Blood-pumping black and double black diamond stretches pack steep elevation in the Iron Range. Those who navigate the dense forest and rocky terrain will also find mining sites along the way.



Half a century later, the story of Michigan's most famous shipwreck still resonates. As a somber milestone approaches, visit sites near where the Edmund Fitzgerald sank.

#### MUSICAL LEGACY


Gordon Lightfoot's haunting
1976 hit, "The Wreck
of the Edmund Fitzgerald,"
tells the tale of
Lake Superior's notorious
November gales
and the ship's fateful
last voyage.



ovember 10, 2025, marks the 50th anniversary since the freighter Edmund Fitzgerald sank during a storm on Lake Superior, killing all 29 of its crew. Remember the tragedy in Whitefish Point, 17 miles from the vessel's final resting place off Whitefish Bay. At the **Great Lakes Shipwreck** Museum in Paradise, an Edmund Fitzgerald exhibit includes the ship's recovered 200-pound bronze bell. You can also watch a 14-minute Fitzgerald documentary in the restored 1923 U.S. **Coast Guard Motor** Lifeboat House and tour the adjacent lighthouse. The museum closes in late October, but hosts a private ceremony for family members only (viewable via live stream) November 10 to commemorate the sinking.

#### MORE SHIPWRECK SITES

## GREAT LAKES MARITIME HERITAGE CENTER Alpena

Part of Thunder Bay **National Marine** Sanctuary, the center sits along Lake Huron's Thunder Bay, near Shipwreck Alley, a stretch where 100-plus vessels have been found. See wreck artifacts and explore a full-size replica schooner. Alpena Shipwreck Tours offers two-hour cruises (until mid-October) aboard a glass-bottom boat for underwater peeks at actual wrecks. Or paddle the bay with help from

# Alpena Kayak Tours. Their boat takes you to an off-shore launching point, where you'll hop in a tandem kayak to ply the waters—no experience necessary. And for safety's sake, the boat follows you.

#### 40 MILE POINT LIGHTHOUSE


near Rogers City

Walk along the beach to see what's left of the wooden steamer Joseph S. Fay, swept to shore in 1905 by violent winds and waves. The ship broke up on a sandbar. Part of her side rests on the beach, held together by metal rods and spikes.

SEARCH FOR SHIPWRECKS Michigan's Underwater Preserves protects 13 sunken ships, some in as few as 5 feet of water, throughout lakes Huron, Superior and Michigan.


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Hunting

More than 10 million acres of thoughtfully managed public land, including 100-plus wildlife management areas, make Michigan one of the most desirable states for hunting. And more than 90 percent of state parks and recreation areas are open for fall and winter hunting. For specific details on regulations, seasons, zones and more, visit michigan.gov/hunting

#### WHITE-TAILED DEER Seasons: fall and winter

Prime Locations Huron-Manistee National Forest near Houghton Lake, the Thumb region, southern Lower Peninsula along the border, and the UP's Hiawatha National Forest

Take part in Michigan's deer camp tradition and spend time in nature with friends and family at a cabin or campsite for hunting season.

#### WOODCOCK Season: fall

Prime Locations State game areas, such as Allegan, Gratiot-Saginaw and Muskegon, plus the western UP

Michigan ranks first in the U.S. for harvesting woodcock.

#### RUFFED GROUSE Seasons: fall and winter

Prime Locations Manistee, Cadillac, Huron-Manistee National Forest near Houghton Lake, and the UP's Ottawa National Forest

The Michigan DNR manages Grouse Enhanced Management Sites (GEMS), which offer walking trails and aspen stands to hunters.

#### PHEASANT Seasons: fall and winter

#### **Prime Locations**

Pheasants are released at 13 state game areas, including Pointe Mouillee, Cass City and St. Johns.

Michigan partners with landowners who agree to allow hunting on their property, part of the Hunting Access Program (HAP).

#### **HUNTING LICENSES**

Anyone born after January 1, 1960, must complete and pass an approved hunter education course in order to obtain a hunting license.

Fishing Michigan touches

Michigan touches four of the five Great Lakes, plus has more than 11,000 inland lakes and thousands of miles of rivers and streams open to licensed anglers looking to hook their next trophy fish. From mid-September through October, salmon, walleye and bass are biting. Colder months bring brown trout and steelhead. The UP's Little Bay de Noc is popular for ice fishing (walleye, perch and northern pike) due to its prolonged season. The protected bay's water tends to freeze early and stay frozen longer. See Michiaan Fishina Regulations for exceptions to seasons and waters listed here. Learn more at michigan.gov/fishing

#### WALLEYE Season ends March 15

Prime Locations Lake Erie, Detroit and St. Clair rivers (year-round), and the UP's Little Bay de Noc These selective biters will put up a fight, making them fun to catch and delicious to eat.

#### PERCH Season: year-round

**Prime Locations** Saginaw Bay, Suttons Bay, and lakes near Alpena

These school fish like the weeds and rocks, and rank as one of the state's mostcaught game fish.

#### SALMON Season: year-round, most waters

Prime Locations Rivers such as the Au Sable, Pere Marquette, Manistee, Muskegon, St. Joseph, and Boardman-Ottaway

September and October are prime months due to spawning and migration.

#### BASS Season ends December 31, 2025

Prime Locations Inland lakes in the Kalamazoo area, Lake St. Clair, and the Au Sable and Manistee rivers

Spirited fighters, bass will challenge anglers.

#### FISHING LICENSES

Fishing licenses are required ages 17 and older.



# **CITIES AND CULTURE**



#### **GOLDEN DAYS**

Fall in Michigan exemplifies what poet John Keats called the "season of mists and mellow fruitfulness."

Shrinking days bring more, not less. More quiet moments in Mackinac Island,

Charlevoix and Saugatuck. More flavors from apples, cider, wine, beer and farm-to-table cuisine.

More festive crowds, like tailgaters in Detroit, Ann Arbor and East Lansing, or Oktoberfest fans in Frankenmuth. And more color everywhere.

Fall in Michigan is gloriously fleeting—as winter wrestles summer into submission, a few precious weeks remain. Here are 10 ways to make the most of this beautiful, bountiful moment.



#### 1. SIP THE CIDER

Cider pressed on-site impresses visitors at Plymouth Orchards and Cider Mill in Plymouth. It's blended with at least five different Michigan apple varieties. Vander Mill in Grand Rapids crafts a variety of artisanal hard ciders—modern, botanical, fruit and heirloom. Sample a flight in their taproom.

# 2. PICK A FLAVOR At Knaebe's Apple Farm and Ciderworks in Rogers City, harvest your own pumpkins and apples, including Jonathan, Gala and Empire. The U-pick apple orchards at Friske Farm Market in Ellsworth beckon with Evercrisp, Fuji, Granny Smith and more. Crane Orchards in Fennville grows varieties like McIntosh, Honeycrisp and Northern Spy.

#### 3. TAILGATE WITH THE TEAM

Join University of
Michigan Wolverines fans
near Michigan Stadium
(aka the Big House) in
Ann Arbor, and gather
with Michigan State
Spartans supporters
around Spartan
Stadium in East Lansing.
The NFL's Detroit Lions
host a free tailgate party
outside Ford Field.

#### 4. WALK IN THE WOODS

Follow either of two short trails through the trees at Grand Mere State
Park in Stevensville to reach sand dunes and the Lake Michigan shore. The 11-mile Manistee River
Trail passes hardwoods atop river bluffs in Manistee. A highlight: crossing a wooden suspension footbridge.

#### 5. PEDAL AND PADDLE

Bicyclists ride the rails at Kal-Haven Trail State Park, a nearly 34-mile former railroad route linking Kalamazoo and South Haven. In the UP town of Hessel, Woods and Waters offers guided kayak, canoe and SUP tours of Lake Huron's Les Cheneaux Islands.

#### 6. TAKE AUTUMN DRIVES

When leaves fall, so do golf course rates. Find colors and deals at Treetops Resort in Gaylord (holes six and 15 on the Jones Masterpiece course are especially resplendent in autumn) and Gull Lake View Golf Resort in Augusta. (Hues imbue the Stoatin Brae, Stonehedge North and Stonehedge South courses.)

#### 7. CRUISE FOR COLOR

Leaf-peep from fresh perspectives, like aboard the *Bavarian Belle*Riverboat in Frankenmuth.
The paddle-wheeler carries passengers on one-hour trips (until late October). Or hop on the Huckleberry Ghost Train at Crossroads Village in Flint for a 40-minute ride into the countryside behind a steam locomotive.

#### 8. WING IT


It's the season to watch migrating flyers. Whitefish Point Bird Observatory in Paradise is a birder's paradise—thousands of birds soar past. Peninsula Point, on Stonington Peninsula near Escanaba, attracts monarch butterflies headed to Mexico. In early fall, see them flit en masse along the shore.

#### 9. SCARE UP FUN

Shop and dine at The Village at Grand Traverse Commons in Traverse City, then take an eerie tour of the site, once an asylum. Michigan's first state prison, in Jackson, morphed into Armory Arts Village. Learn about the site's history and architecture with Jackson Historic Prison Tours.

#### 10. SEEK AERIAL THRILLS

Copper Peak in Ironwood dares you to reach the top of the world's largest artificial ski jump via a chairlift, 18-story elevator ride and an eight-story climb. In Boyne Falls, test your nerve on SkyBridge Michigan, the world's longest timber-tower suspension bridge.



# ONE MORE FOR THE ROAD

Summer's end does not have to mean vacation's end. In fact, as crowds disperse after Labor Day, these popular Michigan towns get a little more quiet—and a lot more colorful.



#### HISTORIC HAPPENINGS

Follow the sound of cannon fire to Fort Mackinac, where costumed interpreters roam the grounds. It's one of several Mackinac State Historic Park sites, such as the Biddle House, within Mackinac Island State Park, which covers 83 percent of the island.



Saugatuck sits along Michigan's Fruit Belt, which stretches the length of the Lower Peninsula. Taste autumn's bounty at Pennyroyal Cafe and Provisions, a farm-to-table restaurant that grows much of its own produce.



#### STONE SECRETS

Earl Young used stones he found in Lake Michigan to build his whimsical houses. In town, rock hounds can find Charlevoix and Petoskey stones at Michigan Beach Park and Mt. McSauba Recreation Area.

#### **MACKINAC ISLAND**

The weather usually stays warm enough after Labor Day for lounging in a cabana beside Grand Hotel's pool or riding a horse-drawn carriage between the resort's two 9-hole golf courses. To see more of the car-free island, rent a bike and pedal the 8.2-mile perimeter. On the water's edge, just past pup-friendly Mission Point Resort, look for a stairway leading to Arch Rock. Learn all about the formation at the new Milliken Nature Center.

#### **SAUGATUCK**

A canopy of crimson and gold shelters hikers on the forested Beach Trail to the shoreline at Saugatuck Dunes State Park. If Lake Michigan is too cool to dip your toes in, swim in the heated pool at Old Pike Cottages (open through October 31), or guests can use a complimentary kayak at Lake Shore Resort. Fuel up for shopping with blueberry maple syrup-doused baked French toast at Lady Bird's brunch. The downtown district overflows with artists. Pop into dozens of galleries and chat with the artists during the Art Coast of Michigan Fall Gallery Stroll (October 10-11).

#### CHARLEVOIX

Fantastical elements permeate this lakeside town, thanks in part to architect Earl Young, who built 26 homes fit for a hobbit out of stones. (See them on a Mushroom House tour.) Young incorporated a meteorite into Stafford's Weathervane Restaurant's stone fireplace. It's a snug dinner spot after sifting through ephemera at True North Interior Design and Antiques. More magic winds through the Castle Farms' gardens. Michigan honey and maple syrup at Harwood Gold Store and Cafe make a sweet souvenir.

# LIFE IS GOOD

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
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Autumn offers abundant vistas and venues for weekend visitors to drink in the scenery.

Toast at adults-only or family-friendly destinations—or climb above the tree line.

#### TRAVERSE THE TUNNEL OF TREES

Harbor Springs to Cross Village, 20 miles

Leafy branches with color-tinged leaves line this twisting, narrow band of road that hugs Lake Michigan as it winds through small towns reminiscent of storybook scenes.

The Highlands in Harbor Springs makes the perfect getaway base, with scenic fall-color chairlift rides and a short hike to North Peak for views of the Mackinac Bridge on the horizon, before setting out on your scenic drive. Pull off at Pond Hill Farm, where you can smash, launch, bowl or select a pumpkin at the Fall Fest every weekend. Open since 1934, the Good Hart General Store offers one-stop shopping with gourmet goods and gifts, grocery items, and a deli and bakery. In Cross Village, Legs Inn, a seasonal logand-stone restaurant (closes October 19), looks as if it were plucked from a child's imagination, with stove legs protruding from the roof and fantasy creatures carved into the interior furniture. The fall season draws a crowd, but a patio table overlooking a lake and house-made Polish dishes (cabbage rolls, kielbasa, sauerkraut and pierogies) merit the wait time. Back in Harbor Springs, end the evening with s'mores around a bonfire or a dip in the outdoor heated pool.

#### WORTH THE DETOUR

Headlands International Dark Sky Park sits at the Tip of the Mitt west of Mackinaw City. Spread out a blanket and scan the sky for shooting stars.



#### SALUTE THE SUNRISE SIDE

Port Huron to Bay City, 154 miles

Michiganders love to demonstrate town locations using the palm of their right hand to represent the Lower Peninsula. This scenic drive traces the Thumb beginning at the base where the St. Clair River flows into Lake Huron.

In Port Huron, you'll find Fort Gratiot Light Station, the state's oldest, with tower climbs and guided tours. Watch massive freighters pass under the Blue Water Bridge next to the **Thomas Edison** Depot Museum inside the Fort Gratiot train depot, where Edison worked as a newspaper reporter. The eco-chic CityFlatsHotel was formerly a bank in the 1900s. Boutiques and one-of-a-kind shops fill picturesque downtown Lexington. North of Port Sanilac, there's a secret beach at 4 Mile Scenic Turnout, with more sand, seagulls and songbirds at Port Crescent and Bay City state parks. Rent gear from Port Austin Kayak and paddle to one of the state's most unique rock formations, Turnip Rock.

#### WORTH THE DETOUR

North of Bay City, the lake-hugging road becomes Heritage Route US-23. At Oscoda, follow the 22-mile River Road National Scenic Byway along the famed Au Sable River, with overlooks, trails and Lumberman's Monument Visitor Center.



#### CRUISE ALONG THE COAST

St. Ignace to Rapid River, 124 miles

From the base of the Mackinac Bridge across the lower section of the Upper Peninsula, a portion of the Top of the Lake Scenic Byway runs along Lake Michigan before reaching the Hiawatha National Forest.

The Boardwalk Hotel is a stunning threestory building on the main thoroughfare in downtown St. Ignace. It has easy access to restaurants, shops and cultural attractions, such as the Museum of Ojibwa Culture. As you drive west, the road splits a tapestry of fall color to the north and sandy dunes to the south. Trek to the beach (230-plus steps) at the Cut River Bridge, or soak up the vibe at the roadside park. In Naubinway, Moofinfries covers the basics with

burgers, Great Lakes whitefish, freshcut fries and ice cream on the menu. At Manistique, the red **East Breakwater Light** marks the road's brief reunion with Lake Michigan. Down the highway in Thompson, US-2 tucks into the millionacre **Hiawatha National Forest**, where you'll find UP solitude at its finest.

#### WORTH THE DETOUR

Watch trout dart in emerald waters from a hand-cranked raft at Kitch-iti-kipi, aka The Big Spring, where the water stays a constant 45 degrees at Palms Book State Park near Manistique. Continue south to the Garden Peninsula to see an 1800s iron processing community-turned-ghost town at Fayette Historic State Park.



#### HONE IN ON HERITAGE

New Buffalo to Detroit, 209 miles

A former Native American trail skims the southern border before cutting through the rolling Irish Hills and automotive legacy towns of Ypsilanti, Dearborn and Detroit.

U-pick pumpkins, parks and a plethora of shops, restaurants, wineries and distilleries pave the way from the Lake Michigan town of New Buffalo to charming Three Oaks. In Three Oaks, Journeyman Distillery is housed in a former corset factory. Climb aboard a steam locomotive train at the Little River Railroad in Coldwater, also home to the 1882 Tibbits Opera House. Michigan's auto heritage comes into focus as you near Detroit. Admire a futuristic DeLorean and other vintage experimental gems at the Ypsilanti Automotive Heritage Museum. At The Henry Ford in Dearborn, time travel through transportation history with a Model Tride in Greenfield Village, witness the final assembly of an F-150 at the Ford Rouge Factory Tour, and see the 1865 Roper Steam Carriage (the oldest surviving American car) at Henry Ford Museum of American Innovation.



## **COLD PLAY**

Viva la vida! Winter in Michigan is the season to live your best life—especially outdoors. Hit the powder on skis, fat bikes, snowmobiles and dons leds. Raft an icy river, paddling through turnels of trees blanketed in white. Hike to frozen waterfalls, see the northern lights and lie back for a thrilling luge run. Or go for a horseback ride, perhaps stopping by wools on a snowy evening, à la the famous words written by Robert Frost, first poet-in-residence at the University of Michigan.



### **SKIJORING**

Rent a harness at Marquette's NTN Forestville Trailhead Chalet to try skijoring, where dogs help pull cross-country skiers over the snow. Revel in onlooker's jealous stares as you and your four-legged friend work together on the uphills. Book a stay at Keweenaw Mountain Lodge in Copper Harbor and explore an additional 10 kilometers of terrain with your pup.

### **FAT BIKE**


Mountain biking doesn't end when snow falls; instead bike tires get wider. Cruise around smooth turns on the Pines and Cedars trails, two easy paths on the north side of Marquette's NTN. Those ready for a challenge can torch their muscles climbing snow-covered sand dunes at the Silver Lake State Park ORV Area and then whooshing down the other side.

## **SNOWMOBILE**

Trails beget trails near Cadillac, and local dealers, like K and R Outfitters, provide guided snowmobile tours. The 92-mile-long Fred Meijer White Pine Trail State Park plunges south and intersects with the Pere Marquette Rail Trail. Pause at the Muskegon River bridge crossing to watch for birds of prey diving after food. Or zoom west to the Huron-Manistee National Forests, a network of 600 trails zigzagging through pines.

## WINTER RAFTING

Flowing water rarely freezes, so bundle up for a float down the Sturgeon or Pine rivers, guided by outfitters such as Sturgeon River Paddlesports in Wolverine, Big Bear Adventures in Indian River, and Pine River Paddlesports in Wellston. Paddle through a tunnel of cedars sagging under the weight of ice and snow as animals sip at the river's edge. Add a hike on the Silver Creek Pathway to your Pine River exploration.



**DID YOU KNOW?** On average, 200 inches of powder fall annually in Houghton, making it the snowiest city in Michigan. Take advantage of the abundant white stuff at Nara Nature Park's sledding hill and the 50-plus miles of snowshoe-friendly paths shared between the wildlife area and the nearby Michigan Tech trail system.



## NEARBY Near Grayling, Mason Tract

Pathway is among Frye's favorite classic skiing spots. Watch for icy conditions on the wild, 8-mile stretch along the Au Sable River. Hanson Hills features loops of various lengths on rolling terrain. Gentle hills, groomed for both classic- and skate-style, help skiers maintain momentum. At Hartwick Pines State Park, the 3-mile Aspen loop is beginner-friendly and maintained through part of an old-growth forest. In Frederic, Forbush Corner features state-of-the-art snowmaking for a longer season.



winter destination beloved by generations, **Cross Country Ski** Headquarters started as a mom-and-pop shop in 1974. Today's visitors can gear up, take lessons, traverse 11 miles of groomed trails, then enjoy live music, bonfires and locally sourced meals from Anavery Fine Foods at Stone Turtle Day Lodge and Cafe. "Almost everyone can have a good time on cross-country skis," says second-generation proprietor Mariah Frye.

Gliding joyfully starts with choosing gear and trails that fit your style and skills. The classic style uses a parallel motion similar to running, whereas skate skiing involves side-to-side, V-shape mechanics on shorter skis. Both encourage balance, coordination and fitness. Wear breathable, lightweight layers with a water-resistant shell to stay cozy even if you fall.

"You can self-pace," Frye says. "The kids can churn and burn, and whoever wants to shuffle along can enjoy the scenery."

Saturdays throughout winter, Cross Country
Ski Headquarters hosts a free group lesson. Private instruction and clinics also attract elite athletes. Frye suggests novices follow established tracks toward Trapper's Cabin, a warm-up spot less than a mile from the trailhead.

## BOYNE MOUNTAIN RESORT, BOYNE FALLS

String together morning powder runs, an afternoon spa treatment and a few waterslide drops—all before dinner. The sprawling property claims one of Michigan's largest indoor water parks and SkyBridge Michigan, the world's longest timber-towered suspension bridge. Even dining feels novel when you book a heated transparent igloo at The Back Forty Biergarten.

## CRYSTAL MOUNTAIN, THOMPSONVILLE

The resort village looks like a scene from a Hallmark movie with twinkling lights, snow-capped bungalows, and inviting restaurants and lounges overlooking ski slopes. The full-scale resort has 59 downhill runs, cross-country ski trails, an award-winning spa, and an on-site art park (Michigan Legacy Art Park) for hikers and snowshoers to explore. Rent a fat-tire bike and pedal to nearby Iron Fish Distillery, Michigan's first farm-based distillery.

### TREETOPS RESORT, GAYLORD

Think of it as a winter base camp in a snowy wonderland. If the 27 downhill runs plus three terrain parks aren't your pace, try snowshoeing, Nordic skiing or a horse-drawn sleigh ride. Spin out on the extreme tubing park's snowy bowl as your tube descends 400 feet while dropping 80 vertical feet. A magic carpet brings tubers back to the top.

## SCHUSS MOUNTAIN AT SHANTY CREEK, BELLAIRE

Customized ski-and-stay packages are a game changer at this winter dreamland with nearly 300 lodging options. Add some discounted lift tickets or dining tickets while booking for members of your party, according to their taste. On the weekend, sign up for a scenic snow-glide tour pulled by a monster snowmobile to see the sprawling property.

## THE HOMESTEAD, GLEN ARBOR

Surrounded by Sleeping Bear Dunes National Lakeshore, the views from the top show off Glen Lake, Lake Michigan and the namesake dunes. Limited ticket sales make for small crowds and wide-open trails for guests on the slopes. Local ingredients shine at each dining spot, and firepits abound across the property to comfort the body and soul.

A web of groomed trails and runs for all skill levels complement the 176-foot-tall artificial jump. Take it all in with a ski-in, ski-out room, cabin or condo based on your unique needs—some sleep six or more people.

## BIG POWDERHORN MOUNTAIN RESORT, BESSEMER

Check into a condo or a ski-in, skiout chalet to beat the morning line at the chairlift. Outside your cozy accommodations, the Gogebic Range of Michigan boasts more than 17 feet of average snowfall. There's even a Bavarianstyle ski village, a full-service bar and grill, and a grab-and-go cafeteria-style restaurant to complete the package.



## CABERFAE PEAKS, CADILLAC


